CINEMATIC STORYTELLING

A 12-session experiential learning course for youth designed for the Driftwood Theatre School with availability September–December 2024

Target Audience: Youth aged 11 to 18

Course Duration: 12 weekly sessions (2 hours each)

Objective: This course aims to introduce youth to the essentials of digital cinematography, focusing on capturing and creating dramatic performances. By the end of the course, students will have a foundational understanding of cinematic techniques, camera operation, lighting, sound, and editing, enabling them to produce short films and capture performances effectively.

Session Breakdown:

Session 1: Introduction to Digital Cinematography

- **Overview:** Introduction to the course objectives, schedule, and key concepts. Discussion on the importance of cinematography in storytelling and dramatic performances.
- Activities: Ice-breaking activities, overview of the filmmaking process, and safety briefing.

Session 2: Basics of Camera Operation

- Overview: Introduction to different types of cameras and basic camera operations, including framing, focus, and exposure.
- **Activities:** Hands-on practice with various cameras, exploring different shots and angles.

Session 3: Composition and Framing

- Overview: Exploration of composition rules and framing techniques to enhance storytelling visually.
- Activities: Practical exercises in framing and composing shots using storyboards and real-life setups.

Session 4: Lighting for Cinematography

- Overview: Basics of lighting, including three-point lighting setup, natural vs. artificial lighting, and the role of lighting in setting the mood.
- Activities: Hands-on practice with lighting equipment, creating different lighting setups for dramatic effect.

Session 5: Sound Recording and Design

- Overview: Introduction to sound recording techniques, including microphone types, placement, and the importance of sound in enhancing performances.
- **Activities:** Practical exercises in recording dialogue and ambient sound using various microphones.

Session 6: Storyboarding and Scriptwriting

- **Overview:** Basics of storyboarding and scriptwriting for film, focusing on visual storytelling and dramatic narrative structure.
- Activities: Creating storyboards and writing short scripts for their own dramatic scenes.

Session 7: Directing Actors for the Camera

- Overview: Techniques for directing actors on camera, focusing on performance, blocking, and delivering emotional scenes.
- Activities: Practice directing fellow students in short scenes, experimenting with different directing styles.

Session 8: Filming Dramatic Scenes

- Overview: Practical session focused on filming the scripted scenes, applying camera techniques, lighting, and sound recording.
- Activities: Students work in groups to film their scenes, taking turns in different roles (director, camera operator, sound engineer).

Session 9: Introduction to Editing

- Overview: Basics of video editing, including an introduction to editing software, cutting, and assembling footage.
- Activities: Hands-on practice with editing software, starting with simple cuts and transitions.

Session 10: Advanced Editing Techniques

• **Overview:** Exploration of advanced editing techniques, including colour correction, sound editing, and adding special effects.

 Activities: Practical exercises in applying advanced editing techniques to their footage.

Session 11: Post-Production and Final Touches

- Overview: Overview of the post-production process, including final edits, sound design, and adding music.
- Activities: Finalizing their edited scenes, focusing on polishing the final product.

Session 12: Screening and Critique

- **Overview:** Screening of the final projects, followed by a critique session. Discussion on challenges faced and lessons learned.
- **Activities:** Presenting their short films, receiving feedback, and reflecting on their learning experience.

Learning Outcomes:

By the end of this course, students will:

- Understand the fundamentals of digital cinematography and its role in storytelling.
- Be able to operate cameras, frame shots, and set up lighting for dramatic scenes.
- Develop skills in sound recording, directing actors, and editing footage.
- Gain hands-on experience with industry-standard equipment and software.

 Collaborate effectively with peers to produce and edit short films.

This course offers a comprehensive introduction to the art of digital cinematography, empowering youth with the skills and knowledge to capture and create compelling dramatic performances.
